Amber's Story

She's only 3.5 pounds, soft heather gray, very gentle with the face of an angel. Why then would someone dump her at a park thinking she could live happily ever after? Why would someone discard her as carelessly as they would a candy bar wrapper?

I received a call from Safe Haven and was asked if I would foster a rabbit that was found abandoned in a local community park. The people who found her were not "rabbit people" and were doing their best to find her a home while they cared for her. They named her Amber because she has a small splotch of amber colored fur on the nape of her neck. Amber was being housed outside, alone and exposed. The summer heat was intensifying and a heat wave warning went into effect. I opened my doors without hesitation and welcomed her into my home to be cared for as she should be.



At first, Amber was very timid and fearful. She appeared unsure of what was

happening and was cage aggressive. Her eating habits were terrible and she dug constantly in her litter making quite a mess. Soon enough though she began to trust me and knew I was on her side, to help her and care for her. I made an appointment with my vet to have her health checked and then to have her spayed. I set up a nice cage for her that she could call her own, bought her new toys and helped her develop better eating habits.

It's been 3 months now and Amber has adapted well and is a very happy bunny. Amber's personality and telltale signs indicate she might do well bonded. Amber does not like to be held or picked up and is still apprehensive towards being handled. She does enjoy being petted, brushed and kissed and loves to be out and in the company of someone. I feel she would do best in an adult home in that she has come to trust again in an adult environment. You may have heard about 'The Great Bunny Rescue' which was undertaken by Best Friends Animal Shelter located in Reno, Nevada. If not, the story goes that Best Friends received a call from someone who had 800 rabbits in their backyard. Yes, 800! Or so.... And they were multiplying everyday. By the time Best Friends took them all in there were over 1200. With babies being born everyday, the final count was around 1600 before all the spays and neuters were completed. Then, the only task was to find homes for them all. And, that they did!

Safe Haven played a small role by doing home visit checks in NJ and serving as transporter out of Newark airport. A very big special THANK YOU goes out to volunteers Barbara and Rick Bruyer for turning their station wagon into the "BUN MOBILE" and getting the "Boys from Reno" to their NJ home.

On August 26th, Barbara, Rick and I headed to Newark airport to meet 8 rabbits being flown in. Barbara, having tracked their flight which originated in Sacramento, CA and stopped in Houston, TX noted that the plane was just over Indiana as we headed to the airport - not that we were anxious or anything! We also were to meet Jill (from Massachusetts) who would be taking two of the rabbits home with her. The other six, all neutered males, would go with us to Lambertville. Once reaching the airport, we patiently waited for their arrival and soon we had our 8 charges.

After finding a quiet spot in the airport and separating them to determine who was who, we settled our surprisingly calm bunnies into the car for the ride home.

Judging by the reactions we saw those two days...the animals quickly recognized the benefits and loved it!



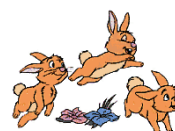

Pickles

When Jim and I decided to make a bunny part of our family, I spent about three months waiting for the right bun to come along. The moment I saw Pickles on the Safe Haven website, I knew he was our boy. I have always had animal companions with all kinds of issues show up on my doorstep. It seems I have never had a “normal” animal living with me, and when I read Pickles’ story, it broke my heart.



Apparently Pickles had endured some pretty rough treatment. Karen rescued him from a kill shelter when they decided that he was aggressive and scheduled him to be put down. He spent 2 years at Safe Haven with Karen spending lots of time working with him.

When I first contacted Karen about Pickles she was hesitant when I told her he would be our first bunny. Pickles still had some strange behaviors she wasn’t sure we would be able to handle. I explained to Karen that I am in the healing arts field, and that I do a form of energy work called Reiki. Reiki is a system of healing that is very beneficial to animals. I have used Reiki on all of my animal companions, and have seen wonderful changes. Karen decided to give us a chance, and we are so grateful. Pickles has now been with us for six months and he is an absolute delight.



It took Pickles some time to adjust to us and his new environment. I spent many hours just sitting on the floor with him. He did not like to be touched at first, so I would just sit near him. I would do Reiki at a distance with him, and then occasionally he would let me

touch him. He slowly began to warm up to us.

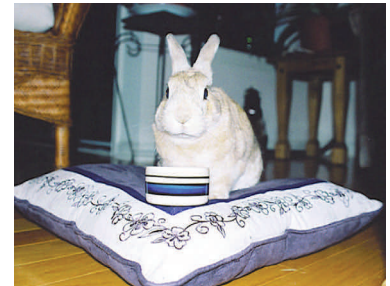
The thing he hated most was being put in his cage at night. First of all, he hated being picked up, and we were not experienced bunny handlers yet, especially with a crazy bunny that did not want to be touched. We would finally get him in his cage, clean and bandage our wounds and then go to bed. Then at 5:00 am Pickles would start biting and boxing his cage demanding to get out. We spent about two weeks hardly sleeping and having our arms covered with bites and bruises

before we decided it might be best for Pickles to not be caged.

Pickles is very good using his litter box and not chewing any furniture, so we gated off a section of the house and just let him “be free”. This worked great until he learned how to break through his gate into the living room. Well, once he discovered the living room there was no going back. So, I bunny proofed the living room and let him have at it. He was thrilled with his new found freedom, until he discovered our guest bedroom. Most of our house has hardwood floors, except for the bedrooms, so when he got his little toes into the wall to wall carpet in the guest bedroom he was elated. So, I bunny proofed the guest bedroom and now we have a crazy Pickles, running full speed through the room with binkies galore. The more space he had to run, the happier he got.

Now, six months later, our entire house is bunny proofed. Pickles is never caged and has full run of everything. He is the happiest bunny. Every morning he flies around our bedroom, spins out across the hardwood floor, then hits the carpet in the guest bedroom. It is hysterical to wake up to. We open our eyes to see Pickles binkying past the bed! He has completely taken over here.

We now even occasionally sit on the balcony together so he can feel like he is a wild bunny. He loves listening to the birds and sniffing the fresh air in the morning. He is so much calmer now. He loves interacting with most things we



do. He now demands his Reiki session every evening, and even lets me massage him, in addition to wanting to be petted all the time. His newest thing is he likes to sit on a purple velvet pillow to be fed his papaya treats and pellets before bed.

Pickles is the sweetest boy, and we are so grateful that Karen saved him, and allowed us to adopt him. We don’t know what we would do without him. He has filled our hearts with more love than he’ll ever know. We are so happy to have him as part of our family.

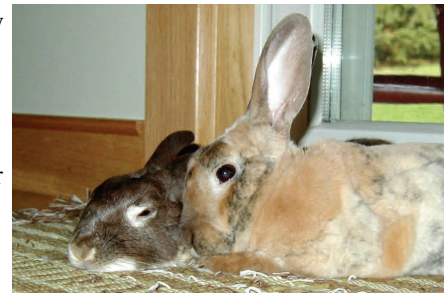
