

Note: This article is not meant to scare you, but as a bunny owner it is important to be aware and can stay current on this disease.

Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease (RHD) is a highly contagious viral disease which attacks a rabbit's internal organs causing them to hemorrhage. It's fairly new to the United States and is often fatal to rabbits. There are two known strains respectively named RHD 1 and RHD 2. So far the virus is not a threat to humans or other animals, passing only from rabbit to rabbit via direct bodily fluids contact (urine, sneezing, licking), contamination, biting insects, wildlife passing through a contaminated area, or humans via shoes and clothing.

Symptoms do not always have time to manifest because the virus comes on quickly and death is sudden, usually within 24 hours for RHD 1 and days for RHD 2. Both RHD 1 and RHD 2 can affect populations of domestic or wild rabbits. Both strains of the virus are hardy and live in the environment for a long time (about 100 days at room temperature and longer when it's cold because the virus goes dormant) and both are easily spread. If an outbreak is documented, strict quarantine efforts are put in place and rabbits may be culled not only to stop the spread of the disease but to humanely put those afflicted to rest because there is no treatment. Rabbits that do survive become carriers and can shed the virus for up to a month and a half, maybe longer.

Vaccines are available in other countries such as the UK where RHD 1 has been around for decades, but are not offered in the United States.

Because of the horrific nature of this disease all outbreaks or suspicions must be reported to state and/ or federal authorities immediately in hopes of containing the area and halting the spread.

In December 2018 a RHD 2 occurrence in Clover Township, Pennsylvania was isolated to one farm and no further reports have been noted.

Indoor house rabbits are at a very low risk but awareness is prudent when visiting fairs, 4H shows, farms, or other venues that bring rabbits in contact with one another and people in contact with that environment. Disinfecting shoes, clothing, and yourself after as a precaution is best.

The article is not written to make you panic but so that you educate yourself and others which is the best way to protect your rabbit and fight this horrible disease.

MOON RABBIT

You have probably heard of the man in the moon but *Did you know* there is a rabbit in the moon?

The legend of such is believed to originate from China 475-221 BC. If you look at a full moon you will see the image of a rabbit within the dark spots. Some see the rabbit facing to the right working the 'divine elixir of life' with a pestle and mortar and others see it facing to the left with a big fluffy tail.

There are variations of the tale thru out Asia and different ancient regions of the world. The China legend tells of a rabbit who serves under Chang'e, goddess of the moon, whose job is to pound the elixir of life for her. One story tells of Chang'e being banished to the moon after stealing the pill of immortality for herself that was to be shared with her husband.

In addition to the legend, The Moon Rabbit has also been a source of inspiration for a number of children's books, movies, and reference to modern day characters and mystical practices.
